WHAT WE DO

Who we are:

A Trust commissioned by East Taieri Church to be the resourcing, funding, and visioning body for its community work.

The Saddle Hill Foundation Trust is a leading Youth Work and Social Services Organisation in the greater Mosgiel and Taieri area - empowering and inspiring youth to embrace their true identity while unleashing their inner potential. Our programs help our youth shape their own values, while providing them with a safe environment and the tools, resources and support they need in order to grow and become confident leaders and influencers of tomorrow. We also seek to empower the entire family community that surrounds them.

We are also responsible for the governance and management of Shop 'n Taieri - an amazing Op Shop in Gordon Road Mosgiel. Saddle Hill Foundation Trust uses all profits from Shop 'n Taieri in the community. The shop is a joint venture between Saddle Hill Foundation Trust and Mosgiel Presbyterian Church.

Who we work with:

There are three strands to the work of the Trust:

- 1) Youth work in the Taieri and Fairfield area with Intermediate and High School students (approx. 10-18 years old)
- 2) Wider Community work with all age groups building wellbeing and combating loneliness and isolation
- 3) Social Enterprise: Activity that supports our community vision, while also raising funds to support the Trust's community work and making hardship grants to individuals.

What we hope to achieve:

- Networking with other agencies and schools while using best demographic and social studies.
- Understanding and responding to our community.
- Promoting volunteering within our community.
- Serving our community by offering resources, people and programmes that develop healthy, positive, meaningful and fulfilling lives.
- Encouraging young people to grow physically, socially, mentally and spiritually within
 positive peer groups. This will be reflected in sound decision making, improved self-esteem
 with young people making good choices about their health and bodies.

- Building positive attitudes and enhancing values and self-esteem by providing opportunities to develop leadership.
- Partnering with local agencies and fostering development by finding local solutions to local problems.
- Through Shop 'n Taieri we aim to provide high quality secondhand goods to the community at reasonable cost.

Despite the challenges of the Covid 19 pandemic and some events being forced to cancel, the trust was able to carry out significant work in the community including:

- Being part of the new Taieri Network
- Holding a mid-winter seniors' dinner
- Overseeing the community garden operating on East Taieri Church land.
- Holding a youth carnival

Shop 'n Taieri

One of the responsibilities that comes under the umbrella of the Saddle Hill Foundation Trust is Shop 'n Taieri - an amazing little Op Shop in Gordon Road, Mosgiel. This is a joint venture with Mosgiel Presbyterian Church.

This is run by 3 part time salaried staff and around 20 volunteers. It offers quality pre-owned items such as clothing, books, jewellery, household items, electrical goods and much more. It is well known for its welcoming atmosphere and friendly staff. There always seems to be a lot of people in there, some shopping and looking for bargains while others are just having a chat. All profits from the shop go back into the community.

OUR PROGRAMMES



Ground Zero

A youth programme which runs during school terms two and four. Ground Zero focuses on leadership, responsibility, respect and team building, as well as developing confidence, self-esteem, leadership qualities and many other essentials life skills.

Summit

A youth programme held in school term three for the students who have graduated from Ground Zero the previous year. Leadership skills are further developed and more responsibility given to students as they are pushed out of their comfort zones and taught valuable life skills. Each week consists of challenges and tasks which continue to develop confidence, self-esteem and leadership qualities as well as providing both a physical and mental challenge.

Challenge

A youth programme held in school term one that has been created and formed from the success of Ground Zero and Summit. This programme is for years 9-10 and has a greater emphasis on using outdoor activities and challenges to enhance the skills and abilities of students. Learning to trust each other and work together is compulsory, as all challenges and tasks require more than one person to complete.

R@ndom

A weekly youth programme for students in years 9-13 focusing on social, emotional, physical and spiritual well-being. This is held during the school term on Friday nights 7.00-9.00pm. R@NDOM is an exciting, sometimes thrilling, social environment which builds friendships, enhances values and develops life skills. Whether based at 'The Hub' or in the wider Dunedin area, R@NDOM provides youth a place to belong. Some (of our many) highlights have included a formal dinner, car rally, beach nights, crazy food challenge nights, mad pizza nights and much more!

Dynamyte

A weekly programme for years 7 and 8 focusing on social, emotional, physical and spiritual well-being. This is held during the school term on Friday nights 7.00-9.00pm at 'The Hub'. It is a place which assists in building positive attitudes and enhancing values and friendships. Some highlights include various wide games, ice-cream sundae night, Tunnel Beach, McDonald's runs and car rally and much more!

Plunge

A weekly youth programme for students in years 7-9 held on Sunday mornings, which explores faith, friendships and positive attitudes.

Chaplaincy

We have a long history of chaplaincy and running mentoring programmes at Taieri College. Our youth team spend time in the school, up to 4 days a week during lunchtimes, catching up with young people, playing games and interacting with them.

Connect for...

The Connect For... programme is small group mentoring students who have been identified by the school as requiring time out from the classroom and positive interaction during class time. This has proved to be very successful, and the school has asked us to increase the number of sessions.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

SADDLE HILL FOUNDATION TRUST CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 2021 - 2022

On behalf of the Saddle Hill Foundation Trust, it is my privilege to bring the Chairman's report for the 2021- 2022 financial year.

This has been a year of challenges, many related to the ongoing effects of the Covid 19 pandemic, and the consequent pressures brought by that, on Staff and the Community we work in. Many of the events/ programs that have usually been held had to be changed, postponed, or cancelled, often at short notice, to the disappointment of all. The necessary observance of the Covid prevention rules also brought its own stresses, and I wish to thank all involved for their dedication during this time. Your work, commitment and perseverance are much appreciated.

Apart from the groups based at The Hub, I also wish to acknowledge the chaplaincy work at Taieri College, and the Community connection through the Shop 'n Taieri. I believe both areas of work improve health and well-being in the Taieri area.

Board and Staff changes have occurred during the year as well, with Andy Doncaster leaving in July 2021, Alan Shanks in November 2021, and Michelle du Plessis in June 2022. On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank them for the dedication and energy they brought to their work and wish them well in their future endeavours.

Nick Muirhead accepted the role of interim Executive Officer in August 2021, Graham Weir the role of interim SHFT Chair in November 2021, and Colin Scurr joined the SHFT Board in February 2022.

In conclusion, a big thank you to all our funders, partners, volunteers and all who have supported us in what has been a very difficult year.

YOUTH CARNIVAL

Unfortunately, due to Covid, we were unable to hold a community carnival this year because of the restriction in numbers at public gatherings. So instead, on Friday the 29th of October 2021 we held a Youth Carnival that was restricted to 50 attendees. Pretty much it was just a scaled down version of the Community Carnival and a lot of the activities were the same; Smash the Car, face painting, games and free food. We had 2 students from the polytech on workplace placement who were able to help with a lot of the planning and volunteering on the night.

MID WINTER SENIORS' LUNCH

On the 15th of June 2022 we held a free mid-Winter lunch for seniors in the community. This was attended by over 60 people and was a great success. As well as a great meal provided by volunteers, the guests also enjoyed entertainment, a sing-a-long and fellowship.

"We challenge our young people to step up and the results are very positive both for the young person and the community – one family told us how thrilled they were that their previously quiet youngster had the courage to attend soccer trials after attending our programme and had now taken his skills to a representative level. All it took was a boost in self-confidence for him to take off."

CAMPS

We are slowly growing our YET camps and we are hoping even more will be added to the calendar in the years to come. Camps are a great way of forming deep relationships and growing young people as there is something unique about getting away from the day-to-day distractions. These are some of the exciting camps that currently take place:

Ground Zero: YET run two Ground Zero camps per year so a total of 40 students (2 intakes of 20) head to Waihola for a weekend of fun, activities and challenges.

Summit: YET runs one Summit camp per year which reaches 20 students. It is a weekend at Waihola with many challenging activities.

Challenge: YET runs one Challenge camp per year which reaches 10 students in the year 9-10 age bracket. This camp uses adventure-based learning to instil positive values, skills and attributes in young people. This year the camp was a weekend in tents "off grid", out of cell coverage at a farm near Waitahuna.

Camp Sunday Road Trip: Every year we take a group of young people to a community somewhere in Otago and run their church service and youth group for them.

Ski Camp: Every August YET runs a ski camp. We do everything we can to make it as affordable as possible which includes sleeping on airbeds at a church. This year we had 40 youth and leaders attend our ski camp.

A big thank you has to go to Calder Motors for maintaining our two YET vans which make it a LOT easier to run these awesome and life changing camps.

Saddle Hill Foundation Trust (SHFT) is a trust commissioned by East Taieri Church to be the resourcing, funding and visioning body for it's community work.

- To reach out to the needy, unemployed and socially disadvantaged in the community in order to encourage and train them in work skills and self reliance.
- To organise and create employment opportunities for the relief of unemployment and poverty, and to provide opportunities for financial help to those wishing to further their individual and/or vocational skills.

Community Shop part time Shop Manager, part time Assistant Manager and 2 part time shop workers

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:*

The Saddle Hill Foundation Trust is reliant on external funding to support its programmes.

Our main sources of income are a grant from East Taieri Presbyterian Church which is evergreen, and also grants from organisations. Donations are received but these contribute minimally to our overall income.

The aim of our social enterprise (Shop n Taleri) is to help us be less reliant on external grants. The Shop is run by the Trust but also in partnership with the Mosgiel, North Taleri Presbyterian Church.

During the year Dynamyte was run 28 Provide a safe times, plus additional events such as YET camp, ski camp, and Easter event. Each session averaged 11 students attending.

During the year Dynamite was run 32 times. Each session averaged 13 students. The students also talk part in YET Camp.

School Chaplaincy - this service provides mentoring and friendship to students. Our school chaplains are available in times of need within the school setting. Chaplaincy also Includes a programme called Connect For . . . this is a mentoring programme for Year 7-9 students at the local High School. The sessions provide students space to share about life and provides them with skills to overcome life's challenges and to be able to make positive life decisions. The students explore issues such as communicating with others, taking turns, honesty, respect and trust.

Connect For . . . mentoring sessions were held in term 3 and 4 2021 for year 7 and 8 students. Two groups were run in term 3 with a total of 8 students attending. The groups finished early in the term due to Covid 19 lockdown. In term 4 a third group was started at the request of the students. A total of 18 students attended across the three groups in term 4. The mentoring has been delayed in start for 2022 due to the ongoing disruptions of Covid 19. The program requires students to be settled into school routines so those who require extra support can be identified - these students are then referred by teaching staff to the program.

Continue the Impact programme at Taieri College

Other programmes include our church based youth programmes and events and community projects and intern programme.

Church faith based youth groups are run each Sunday during school terms. A senior's mid winter lunch was held in partnerhsip with ET church, to build connectedness for the community with explore the bible. 65 people attending. The Mosgiel Resource Group held 8 meetings during the year, with the majority of these being on line. The facilitation and leadership of the resource group has now been handed over to the Taieri Network.

Church Youth Groups run each Sunday during school terms. We have partnered with Otago Neighbourhood Support to help build connectedness and resilience in the community. Together we have run community initiatives such as a mid-winter lunch with 65 attendees... Business Breakfast's were he;d in Novementer 202 (17 attendees) and February 2021 (36 attendees). Eighty people attended a dinner to raise funds for the Community Carnival which was a huge success with over 200 people attending. The Mosgiel Resource Group held 10 meetingd during the year.

Basis of Preparation*

Saddle Hill Foundation Trust has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting.
